## Director's Notes

Rehearsing THE REFUGEE KING has forced me to ponder a few things.

HOME. Close your eyes and whisper "home" a couple of times to yourself. What images come to mind? With eyes still shut, put voice to the word, saying it aloud a couple of times. Say it slowly. Feel all the sounds in the word. Do the images change? Who is there with you in your imagination? Who isn't there? What emotions are evoked? Have you ever felt as if you have no home? "Home" is a powerful word.

Have you ever been in a conversation with one other person, then suddenly thought to yourself, "Wait, this isn't just a normal conversation?" In a moment like that, does it seem like there's another presence or another voice or another spirit there with you? People call these events by various terms: a "God wink," a "divine appointment," or a "holy conversation." I'm not sure I like them, because in them, I feel like I am expected to ask questions I am afraid to ask. I am expected to be vulnerable and reveal something about myself which makes me uncomfortable. The ramifications of these conversations are sure to be disruptive to my routine. And yet, some of them lead to unexpected and beautiful blessings; therefore, maybe I do like them.

In the 25th chapter of the Gospel of Matthew, Jesus told a parable in which a "King" famously said, "I was hungry and you gave me something to eat, I was thirsty and you gave me something to drink, I was a stranger and you invited me in." A few verses later in the story, the "King" explains, "whatever you did for one of the least of these my brothers and sisters, you did for me."

Assuming that, through his parables, Jesus is trying to teach me how to live righteously and abundantly, and if I try to practice what Jesus teaches, how do these verses actually play out in my life? What are the ramifications for my financial health, my emotional health, my relational health, my spiritual health? In short, what will it cost me? And what blessings will come my way? Should I even be asking these questions, or should I simply follow the teaching of Jesus without question?

Remember those billboards from "God" several years back, the ones with black backgrounds and big white letters with messages purportedly from God? One of them said, "That love your neighbor thing? I meant that." That billboard didn't include any mention of what loving my neighbor might cost, but our play certainly wrestles with the question.
